Fr. Sean Koehr Ordination Reception Jim Koehr Talk June 8, 2019

- Introduction
 - Colleen, our boy is a Catholic Priest!
 - Sean, I am **bursting with so much pride** I am going to have to go to **confession**
 - I'm not going to you though!
 - I feel like a "made" man in the Catholic mafia
 - And you Colleen you are going straight to heaven!
 - If you are in this tent, it is because you played some role in Sean's vocation.
 - Colleen and I are so pleased to have you share our joy tonight
 - When I'm done speaking, in about an hour or so, you'll be meeting some of the most impactful
 - Please allow me to introduce a few right now
 - o First, Sean's Grandparents
 - What a blessing to have them here to witness this.
 - Sean, how many people your age could have **all four grandparents** attend an event like this?
 - Or better yet, how many these days can say they have grandparents that have demonstrated such an extreme level of fidelity?
 - Both sets of grandparents are **well beyond their 50th** wedding anniversaries.
 - Grandma and Grandpa Koehr (RADM Jim and Erma) are just about to hit their 57th in July
 - Grandma and Grandpa **Carey** (Jack and Beth) are just about to hit their **60**th in June
 - I'm quite sure their loving example of Christian marriage has led to the strong extended family of which you are a part.
 - And I'm equally sure that example of family played a role in your vocation
 - Here's a special shout out to my mother
 - Look around Mom.
 - You've come a long way from an orphaned youngest daughter of Italian immigrants in a company coal mining town
 - To paraphrase a line from the most recent play at Seton School
 - You're not in Iowa anymore!

- Bishop Burbidge and Fr. Searby
 - We are so pleased to have **so many priests and seminarians** here to share our joy
 - But two I'd like to especially welcome
 - When Bishop Burbidge's feet hit the floor each morning Satan says to himself,
 - "Oh crap! He's awake!"
 - (I'd love to take credit for that one, but I totally stole it from Josiah Bookwalter thanks Chewy!)
 - **Bishop Burbidge**, we are so blessed **to have you** in our diocese and at our home
 - You are **exactly the leader Christ's Church** in Arlington needs right now
 - And **as Sean's father**, I could not be more pleased to see him **enter his vocation under your guidance** and leadership
 - And, of course, **Fr. Searby**
 - Sometimes I feel like **we've already had our own family priest** for many years now.
 - You are **exhibit A1** that joy is the key to evangelization
 - I'm not sure if even I have fully absorbed the entirety of the impact you've had on our family
 - o Sean for sure
 - But all the confessions in the Man Room, trips abroad and family dinners in which you participated have not gone unnoticed
 - And who knows, your **joyful example** and those sorts of **gestures, small and large**, may lead to **another vocation** from our family
 - I can see already that it is **leading to strong** marriages.
 - I simply cannot express in words my gratitude for having you in our lives

- Colleen
 - o And finally, Sean's mother, Colleen
 - For those of you here with lots of kids, you've heard some variation on
 - 12 kids! All from one woman?
 - I just love telling people, "yeah, all from my first wife"
 - I'm sure Colleen and her wisdom was a big part of Sean's vocation.
 - Colleen intuitively understood that we are all born entirely selfish and that children just don't grow out of that on their own.
 - As infants, we cry to get what we want
 - Some of us still do.
 - o It's the manifestation of original sin I suppose
 - Even as a young mother Colleen somehow knew that **kids didn't automatically grow out of that**.
 - She used to **refer to the process** of getting a kid out of that mindset as "**breaking them**"
 - She meant **like a horse**.
 - If kids are like horses, Sean was the **toughest of untamed broncos** for her
 - In fact, Sean's been **causing Colleen problems** since the day he was born
 - at **10 lbs. 13 oz.**
 - I see a lot of women cringing in pain right now
 - I remember early in Sean's time at the Seminary
 - He was **sent back to his home Parish** to speak about his calling.
 - His first Mass was Saturday night
 - We weren't there, because, as those of you who know us already know
 - Colleen goes to 9:00 a.m. Mass no matter what happened on Saturday night.
 - That evening, before Sean got home, **Colleen's phone** was beeping and binging and ringing with her **friends messaging and calling**
 - "What a great young man Sean is!"
 - "How did you do it Colleen?"
 - A little later, Sean got home

- From the look on his face, he was clearly pleased with how his first talk went
- And then he saw his mother
 - "Sean, you need to tell those women the truth!"
 - "You were a pain in my ass!"
- Sean has received a lot of such guidance from Colleen in his life
 - And now I'm going to take a crack at it

- Expectations for Fr. Sean as a Priest
 - I don't have
 - o Experience in Mrs. Carroll's Senior Religion class, or
 - o a four-year degree in philosophy from Notre Dame
 - and I don't have **seven years** of in-depth education and formation in the **seminary**, but
 - I have been able to answer some of the deeper theological questions from my children
 - Like, "Are the charioteers the girl chariots?"
 - But a lack of formal theological training is not gonna stop me from giving my thoughts on what I think you need to do to be a great priest
 - My goal is to describe your Father's expectations of you as a priest
 - For you **younger ladies** out there, **especially** those with initials like **CMK or SCC**, I hope you are **paying attention**
 - What I'm about to describe won't be all that different from the expectations that you should have for any man in your future
 - Sean, one **caveat** before I begin though
 - You've been playing sports at a fairly high level all your life
 - And I've always told you that if I ever give you guidance that contradicts your coach, go with what the coach says
 - Which is probably why I just became your coach
 - But that applies here too
 - While I'm confident that I may phrase some of this differently than your new coach, Bishop Burbidge,
 - I doubt I'm going to say anything that Bishop Burbidge will disagree with,
 - but knowing you and your mother if I do, I'm sure I'll hear about it before I get my next beer

• #1 Be Holy

- You once told me that to be a Priest, you need to want "more"
- o Remember what "more" is
 - It is your personal relationship with Jesus Christ
- I'm not going to pretend I fully understand that on the level that you'd better, but I do understand these three things:
 - First, I know that Christ said, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing."
 - He's called you to have a deeply personal relationship with him
 - If your motivation comes from a source other than that, you will be secretly motivated by a variety of other possible motivations
 - None of them good for your vocation
 - Second, I know that any deeply personal relationship takes effort.
 - In this case it means an unwavering **dedication to prayer**
 - I've noticed in my life, if I ever wanted to make sure that I did something that was important to me, I'd do it very first thing in the morning before my day got hectic
 - That was true back when I used to train for triathlons
 - It was true when we were doing that Exodus
 90 exercise together recently
 - And I'm quite sure it is true for a person as busy as a dedicated priest
 - Block the first hour of you day in peace to work on your relationship with Jesus.
 - If you have the 6:30 a.m. Mass, that may mean getting up at 5:00 a.m.,
 - but that is later you got up for swim practice.
 - I'd expect that to "bear much fruit"
 - And third, I know that being a priest is a very demanding job
 - If you lose track of the "more" and allow it all to become vanity, all you'll be left with is
 - A very **demanding** and **lonely job**
 - That requires you to work weekends
 - For the **world's largest bureaucracy**

• And really crappy pay

- That sounds like "less" not "more" to me
- I can't say I know this for sure, but
 - I'd bet that any **priest who has lost his zeal** for the priesthood
 - first lost his intimacy with Jesus Christ
 - And that **left him without the "more"** you were telling me about
- Be Holy that is your Father's expectation

- #2 Be a Man
 - You need to be a real man, because this is who God made you.
 - We have **men as Catholic Priests for a reason**
 - Because Jesus picked men
 - I've had people try to tell me that Jesus chose all men as his disciples because he was succumbing to the social norms of the day
 - He was God!
 - He violated nearly every social norm of his day without hesitation
 - Jesus was **so politically incorrect** that he literally **risked his life every day** of his public ministry
 - I don't believe for a minute he picked Men for any other reason than the way God made men
 - You once gave me a book called **"Wild at Heart"** by John Eldredge
 - It talked about how to raise boys.
 - The **basic thesis** of the book was that there are **three desires** that make **boys and men unique** in the world.
 - A man's heart has a desperate desire for:
 - A Battle to Fight
 - An Adventure to Live
 - A Beauty to Rescue
 - The Battle
 - You certainly have a battle on your hands.
 - Satan is all around us even inside our own church.
 - **The guy's good**, we must admit.
 - You are going to have to be better
 - As a child of 911, you've always heard "See something, Say something".
 - That's not going to be you.
 - If you see something, **DO something**
 - The Church, and the world for that matter, doesn't need any more "nice boys"
 - That is **pitifully insufficient**
 - It needs strong men who can occasionally kick some ass with the money changers in the Temple

• The Adventure

- Adventure requires something of us
 - It puts us to the test
- Think about the **recipe for the perfect boy's game** when you were a kid:
 - Start with any challenging activity
 - Stir in some exploration
 - Throw in a heavy dose of **danger**
 - And mix it all together with your brothers and friends
 - o Voila! The perfect boy's.....adventure
- Challenge, Exploration, and Danger with people you love
 - Sounds a lot like the recipe for the adventure on which you embarked this morning.
- Christ had 1,000 days and hopefully you will have 20 times that.
 - o I've always had high expectations for you,
 - but even I don't expect you to live the adventure with the gusto and impact that Christ did.
 - But he's your model
- Treat your **time following Christ** like the greatest adventure possible.
 - Treat this adventure with a sense of wonder in how the Holy Spirit works in the world
 - And relish the **opportunities to step forward** into the **most challenging and dangerous situations**.
- The Beauty
 - There is definitely a beauty that needs to be rescued. • Christ's Church.
 - Predators surround Her
 - Men must be Her protectors
 - Real men stand up to evil and injustice on behalf of those who cannot
 - I don't think it is a coincidence that we refer to the Church in the feminine.
 - Men are Her protectors.

- So, your vocation is the perfect role to fulfill your purpose as the Man that God made you.
- I know you like **CS Lewis**
 - About 80 years ago, he said: "We castrate and bid the geldings be fruitful"
 - His words are even more true today.
 - You are no gelding
 - You are a great black stallion!
 - You even wear black
 - Coincidence? I think not!
- And if you ever want to celebrate your manhood with a bourbon and a 50-ring cigar, I know just the guy to do it with
 - Please don't forget to come home every once in a while
- Be a Man that is your Father's expectation

- #3 Be Faithful
 - I never understood the concept of a catholic priest who didn't fully accept the teachings and teaching authority of the Church.
 - How could a man commit his whole being in the service of the Church and not go all-in on the Church's teaching and tradition?
 - I say it like it will be easy, but I know it won't be
 - You were **committing your whole being** to the Church **founded** by **Christ Himself**,
 - the most impactful non-governmental organization in the history of the world
 - It is quite true that, over the course of history, the Catholic Church has been led by some men who have behaved quite badly.
 - Or even some who were **outright evil**
 - I know you **learned a lot** about some of those men in your **religion classes at Seton** with Mrs. Carroll.
 - But always remember <u>Christ's Church is bigger than the men</u> who lead Christ's Church.
 - Sean, you are now the **most liberally educated member** of our extended family, by far
 - And you are also now a caretaker of 2,000 years of Church Tradition
 - Without Tradition, the Truth, along with the magisterium of the Church, is left to the whim of flawed men
 - Never allow yourself to fall into the trap I see so many highly educated people far into
 - Never allow yourself to become so arrogant that you substitute your judgment of the Truth for the tradition and magisterium of the Catholic Church
 - Or even for the dictates of readily observable Natural Law
 - But for heaven's sake, be willing to meet people where they are.
 - I remember being castigated in the confessional once for not knowing the exact words to the Act of Contrition.
 - Personally, I think God was happy I was there.
 - It's not always about the dance steps, it's about the dance.
 - I realize that ritual is an important part of our Church, so the dance steps do play an important role.

- Like a lot of your future parishioners, I'd love to do it exactly right.
- So, wouldn't it just have been better for that priest to put a printed copy of the Act of Contrition up in the box for people like me?
- Or even better
 - Is there some rule that says you have to give
 - 2 Hail Marys for yelling at your kids,
 - 5 Hail Marys for killing someone, and
 - 6 Hail Marys for driving slow in the fast lane?
 - How about if you said something like this:
 - Jim, you've had 9 kids graduate from Seton and three more on their way.
 - Don't you think it might be a **little embarrassing** if it ever came out at an event **attended by a large number of Seton people** that you **don't know** the exact words to the **Act of Contrition**?
 - But hey, your secret's safe with me
 - For your penance,
 - go memorize the act of contrition, and
 - say it three times without looking
- Fr. Scalia calls that "Truth with Charity"
 - I like that
- Be Faithful that is your Father's expectation

- #4 Be Joyful
 - From **Fr. Searby's** living **example**, you know personally how **attractive** real joy can be.
 - We have far too many dour Catholics in this world
 - Think about what we believe.
 - It's incredible I know, but We believe that
 - God sent his only son
 - to die for us
 - to open the gates of heaven and
 - that even our suffering his redemptive
 - If we actually believed everything that we say we believe, how could we be unhappy?
 - That's **impossible for most of us humans**, of course.
 - But the key thing to remember
 - <u>a dour Catholic does more harm to the work of</u> <u>evangelization that an outright unfaithful one.</u>
 - At least the unfaithful don't confuse people by pretending that our Faith is something special
 - Let me give you two (2) pieces of practical advice about being joyful:
 - First, I hope you realize that your smile is one of your most potent weapons
 - And I mean your particular smile
 - When you smile at someone, you are telling them that they bring joy into your life
 - And that will **open them up** to you
 - This applies in group settings to
 - There are certainly times to be serious as a Priest,
 - but some of the most **effective homilies** I've heard were **given with a broad smile**.
 - Second, with the demands you are undertaking, you will inevitably find yourself feeling dour
 - Whenever I get overwhelmed and start flipping out in the kitchen, I find it helpful when I remember to think of Michigan Football
 - Yes, I know that, as Notre Dame graduates, neither of us normally find much joy in Michigan football
 - But I love their coach, a strong Catholic man, Jim Harbaugh
 - Coach Harbaugh is famous for asking his team,

- "Whose got it better than us?"
- To which they all answer, "Nobody!"
- I **don't know** what the great **philosophers say** about **joy**, but I've always found that **the key to true joy is gratitude**
 - It is one of the reasons I find myself so joyful tonight
- On joy, I think you might be able to **take a lesson** from your brother **Patrick**.
 - If I were a Catholic priest and fully believed that I was about to change bread and wine into the real body and blood of Christ, I think I would
 - stand in the back of the church before every mass,
 - look up to heaven, and
 - say "This is literally going to be the best mass ever!"
- Be Joyful that is your Father's expectation

- #5 Be Excellent
 - Fr. Searby has also proven over and over again, excellence is very attractive
 - It always pleased me to know that you had so much guidance and direction from **Opus Dei** during your years at Notre Dame
 - From that, you learned that **everything you do** in your daily life, no matter how mundane, should be **done for the glory of God**.
 - In other words,
 - Excellence is not merely compatible with Catholicism
 - Excellence is required by Catholicism
 - Which means that everything you do should be absolutely the best you can do
 - That should start with **the way you will encounter the most people** in your ministry
 - With your Homilies
 - We've **talked about this before** and you have made it your own already, but here is **Dad's 30 second Homiletics class**
 - Hook me in the first 10 seconds so, as you once said, I don't zone out until the Creed
 - Tell me a story
 - Explain the story for those of us who are slow, and
 - End with a twist on the same hook you started with
 - Spice it up with
 - A little **humor**
 - the occasional **self-deprecating remark**, and
 - Some of those **impressions** that you are so good at
 - I hope I'm at Mass with you if there is ever a time when you find **Monty Python** useful to make your point!
 - That is one formula for a great 8 to 10-minute homily
 - It's not all that different from the formula that makes for a great Country music song
 - You are already among the best I've heard at this
 - Your call to holiness with your homily that used Ben Hur's "Row Well and Live"
 - Or your call to the cross with Earnest Shackleton's advertisement for crew members on his expedition to Antarctica
 - Those were **really good, truly**

- The key point here is the power of stories
 - It's why Jesus **spoke in parables**
 - It's why we have **Saints** and **stained-glass** windows
 - There's a never-ending supply of stories for you to use
 - Not just from Church history, but from secular history as well.
 - But if you need to make a little bit of it up, feel free
 I don't think God would mind
- Excellence should extend beyond the homily into everything you do
 - The energy you put into confession
 - The love you show the grieving Family
 - The patience you show to a mother struggling with her children or her marriage
 - It should even extend to the more mundane things you do
 - Like how you run a meeting.
 - There's no requirement for a church meeting to go from 7:30 to 9:00, independent of content
 - Or the way you dress.
 - Make sure your shoes are shined and your shirt pressed
 - Color coordination shouldn't be a problem
- Be Excellent that is your Father's expectation

• Finally, #6 Be a Leader

- o Sean, I'm sure you remember Mom's Grandfather, Pops
 - For the rest of you, Pops was a wonderful old Irishman who proved that the fountain of youth flows with Schmitz beer and vodka
- Pops used to say, "Hard work ain't easy"
 - I never actually agreed with that.
 - Hard work should be easy for you Sean
 - Especially now that you're on a mission from God.
 - No, <u>Hard Work is the easy part</u>
 - What's hard is being responsible
- To be a great priest, you have to be a great leader
 - When you pray for God to send someone to make something better
 - Remember to **be open** to the idea that **he's sending you**
 - You've been a leader your whole life
 - You know what it takes
 - But let me remind of four key principles of leadership that, if properly applied, will get people to follow you anywhere
 - Including to Christ
 - They work **independently of the situation**. It could be
 - A business,
 - A school,
 - A club,
 - A family,
 - Even a high school swimming team
 - And I'm quite sure they will work particularly well in the context of the Catholic Church
- People will follow you anywhere
 - If they know that you **love them**,
 - If they feel like they are **personally getting better**
 - If they feel a **part of something bigger** than themselves, and
 - If they feel like they are **winning**
- I doubt you will find it difficult to see how those four key leadership principles can be applied to your ministry as a priest
 - Three (3) of the Four (4) should be pretty straightforward
 - Your parishioners should definitely know that you love them
 - You should be striving to make all of them better people

- And it is difficult to imagine that someone would have trouble seeing the Church as **bigger than then themselves**
- The challenge in today's world is going to be helping the faithful feel like the Church is winning
 - In my own mind, the Church took a huge step toward that this morning
 - The quality of the men I saw ordained this morning gives me great confidence in the future
 - o Now you just have to lead
 - No pressure Fr. Isenberg, but the key to winning here is a continued stream of priestly vocations from
 - o holy,
 - o strong,
 - \circ joyful and
 - talented men like the ones in the pipeline today.
- Be a Leader that is your Father's expectation

- Conclusion
 - I've spoken far too long here, so let me conclude this very personal message to you my son:
 - Be Holy
 - Be a Man
 - Be Faithful
 - o Be Joyful
 - o Be Excellent
 - o Be a **Leader**
 - Those your Father's expectations
 - And they are my expectations too
 - At the **risk of being hyperbolic**, **a risk I will gladly take** because this is what I believe
 - There are countless stories throughout history of
 - the **right man** at
 - the **right time** in
 - the **right place** for
 - the **right mission**.
 - Call me prideful Sean, but I think you are that man
 - I love you
 - Now go do something great!
